

# HIV/AIDS IN ALLEGHENY COUNTY

#### Progress to Date

Since AIDS Free Pittsburgh launched on December 1, 2015, the number of new HIV cases in Allegheny County has declined by 39%. This is the lowest number of new documented HIV cases in Allegheny County over the past decade. This downward trend is promising and indicates the successful collective impact of more than twenty different AIDS Free Pittsburgh organizational partners and stakeholders.

## 2018 ACTIVITIES & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

## Normalize Routine HIV Screening



- 5,068 HIV screenings conducted and 12 people identified as HIV-positive (new cases and persons lost to care) by the AHN Center for Inclusion Health and UPMC Montefiore through the expanded HIV screening efforts of the Gilead Science FOCUS Program.
- 13,640 HIV screenings conducted and 105 people identified as HIVpositive through testing programs supported by the Pennsylvania Department of Health.
- Embarked on the second phase of an assessment to measure HIV stigma among healthcare providers in Allegheny County. The results of this assessment will be used to inform HIV awareness messaging strategies in Allegheny County.
- Launched multi-channel HIV awareness campaigns, including billboards, bus shelters, and digital media.

#### Increase Access to PrEP for HIV Prevention



- Connected **4,563 users** to the <u>PrEP Pittsburgh</u> website through print and digital advertising campaigns, resulting in **7,480 page views**.
- Surveyed **1,253 community members** about PrEP awareness.
- Provided financial assistance to support **62** PrEP-related office visits and **285** PrEP-related laboratory services at local providers.
- Coordinated PrEP grand rounds events for family medicine residents and ob-gyn healthcare providers at local hospitals including Allegheny General, Forbes, Magee-Women's, and West Penn.
- Hired a Health Services Coordinator to facilitate centralized biomedical HIV prevention outreach & navigation in collaboration with the Allegheny County Health Department STD/HIV Clinic.
- Developed PrEP educational materials for women and Spanishspeaking populations.

#### Standardize Early Linkage to Care



- Convened two day-long Community of Practice events where clinical and administrative champions from local HIV primary care clinics shared their experiences developing and implementing RAPID linkage to care protocols. The <u>MidAtlantic AIDS Education and Training Center</u> at the University of Pittsburgh provided continuing education credits.
- The two largest HIV care clinics in Pittsburgh observed:
  - Average 30-day linkage to care rate increased from 44.4% in 2015 to 90.6% in 2018.
  - Average viral load suppression rate increased from 86.9% in 2015 to 91.1% in 2018.

## **2018 FINANCIAL SUMMARY**

#### 2018 Expenditures

A total of \$439,388.50 in expenses were incurred to support AIDS Free Pittsburgh collective impact project activities during calendar year 2018. A carryover balance of \$91,841.76 was used to support project costs during calendar year 2019.

Below are a few snapshots of AIDS Free Pittsburgh funding in action throughout the year. The committed funds have enabled AIDS Free Pittsburgh partners and stakeholders to plan and implement quality improvement strategies, community outreach initiatives, continuing education events and HIV/AIDS awareness media campaigns focused in Allegheny County.




