We envision a community where new HIV infections are rare, people living with HIV receive the care they need, and young people can grow up in a world without AIDS.

ABOUT US

AIDS Free Pittsburgh (AFP) is a public health movement to end the AIDS epidemic in Allegheny County by 2030. AIDS Free Pittsburgh is a collaborative initiative comprised of government agencies, healthcare institutions, and community-based organizations that strive to support and improve the care of people living with HIV/AIDS, as well as communities most at-risk for HIV. AIDS Free Pittsburgh does not provide services directly, but rather works to raise awareness and build collaboration among community stakeholders.

Three Strategies To End the Epidemic



Normalize HIV Testing – Increase the rate of routine screening for HIV/AIDS in medical settings in accordance with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the United States Preventive Services Task Force guidelines.



Increase Access to PrEP - Increase awareness of Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) in the community and build capacity for healthcare providers to identify eligible patients and prescribe PrEP.



Improve Linkage to Care - Use established relationships within the medical community to ensure that people diagnosed with HIV are quickly linked to high-quality care, facilitating faster treatment for those who need it.


AFP's website was developed with community input and is maintained by staff and vendors who identify as members of communities impacted by HIV.


Community members can find information on testing, PrEP, and services for people living with HIV via an interactive map of resources.

In 2024, with input from partner organizations and community outside of Allegheny County, AFP launched AIDSFreeWesternPA.org.








HIV Data Overview



Progress to Date from 2015 to 2023

Since the start of AFP in 2015, there has been a decrease in new HIV diagnoses by 54%. In 2023, there were 66 new HIV diagnoses in Allegheny County. This is a decrease in diagnoses from 2022, where there were 72 new HIV diagnoses in the county. AFP continues to use data to action strategies with intentional partnerships to make a positive impact on diagnosis rates, resources access, and HIV support.


New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County, 2015 – 2023


New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Sex Assigned at Birth in 2023

New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Sex, 2015 – 2023




Males continually represent **more** new HIV diagnoses compared to females.

New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Sex, 2023




New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Race in 2023






New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Race, 2023




Racial disparities in new HIV diagnoses continue to persist in Black/African American communities. Black individuals had an incidence rate **9x** higher than white individuals in 2023.

New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Age Group in 2023






New HIV Diagnoses in Allegheny County by Age, 2023

MSM as a risk factor continues to comprise **most** new HIV diagnoses annually, followed by heterosexual contact.

It is important to note that the risk factor was unknown for approximately one-fifth of all new diagnoses in 2023.



Proportion of all Diagnoses that were Late Diagnoses in Allegheny County, 2015 – 2023





Of new HIV diagnoses in 2023, 29% were classified as late diagnoses (defined as receiving a diagnosis of AIDS within 90 days after an initial HIV diagnosis).


This is an **increase** in the proportion of late diagnoses from 17% in 2022.

The AFP hotline is a number that anyone can call to learn more about prevention and care options and services.

From Jan 2024 to Dec 2024, AFP received 394 phone calls with requests for assistance:

- •226 calls were related to assistance with Ryan White services (housing, food, transportation, dental, and medical case management)
- •10 calls were related to AFP programming and volunteer opportunities
- •22 calls were related to general AFP information
- •7 calls are out-of-state calls (Chicago IL, St. Louis MI, Newark NJ, Warren OH, Charlotte NC, Atlanta GA, Nashville TN)
- The majority of callers live in Allegheny County; however, calls were also received from Butler, Beaver, Washington, Westmoreland, Fayette, and Cambria counties.

Purpose and Methods

Goals:

- Understand awareness and knowledge of PrEP among Allegheny County residents
- Understand barriers to accessing and taking PrEP

Methods


- Partnered with Campos (local marketing firm)
- Online survey hosted on Qualtrics (<5 mins)
- Oversampled groups most impacted by HIV
- Responses collected by:
 - Online research panel representative of the county
 - In-person with tablets at predetermined locations (e.g., bars, bus stops)
 - Social media and dating app advertisements
 - Flyers
 - Community groups














Results (N=1,334)

- Race
 - 998 (75%) were white
 - 261 (20%) were Black or African American
 - 59 (4%) were Asian
- 67 (5%) were Hispanic, Latino/a/x, or Spanish origin
- Gender
 - 664 (50%) identified as women
 - o 584 (44%) identified as men
 - 69 (5%) identified as non-binary/agender/genderqueer/ genderfluid
- 56 (4%) identified as transgender

Overall: 46% of respondents had heard of PrEP and knew what it is for



87% of non-cisgender people have heard of PrEP and know what it's for

79% of men who have sex with men have heard of PrEP and know what it's for





2024 AFP OUTREACH OVERVIEW

2024 AFP Driven Events

Too Hot for July, AFP's annual biomedical HIV Awareness event in partnership with True T Pittsburgh, was held for the 6th time on May 30, 2024, at Allegheny Commons East Park. Approximately 2000 people were present at this free-to-the-public block party celebrating advancements in prevention and treatment that can end the epidemic. The event included free HIV and STI testing, information and resources from local organizations, and performances from local artists and nationally known headliner Alex Newell. Over 60 people were screened for HIV/STIs, 8 people were screened for hepatitis C, and 20 people received mpox vaccines.





2024 AFP Driven Events

National Black HIV Awareness Day, is an opportunity for community members to come together with medical professionals, community leaders, and ASOs to discuss concerns, suggestions, and ideas around services, programs and stigma around HIV. NBHAD is recognized on February 7. AFP partners hosted to events to provide a safe and brave space for discussion, food, and confidential HIV/STI testing. Over 100 people attended these events, 26 people were screened for HIV and STIs, and 5 people took at-home HIV tests.



2024 Community Event Participation

In 2024, AFP participated in over 50 community events that help to build relationships, to eliminate stigma, and to better understanding of the needs of the community.

These events included: Pittsburgh Pride, neighborhood pride events, Recovery Walk, Overdose Awareness Day, Run Amok, Jazz for Hope, Mon Valley HIV Awareness Webinar, multiple ballroom events, conferences, and other community celebrations.

















2024 Sponsorships

AFP values collaboration and supporting partner events. In 2024, AFP sponsored over 20 community events to spread the word about the mission of AFP, and to connect people to resources and services.






















Programming in Community

In 2024, AFP partnered with community organizations and created two programs to encourage wellness.

- Vogue Workshops at True T Pittsburgh:
 These classes occur in a series and a pop-up. During the
 series individuals will learn more in-depth about the
 fundamentals of vogue. Individuals are also educated
 on county data related to HIV and information on
 testing, prevention, and treatment
- Mindfulness and Fitness at Shepherd Wellness Community

This program uses both traditional and unconventional forms of exercise to keep the community members active and healthy. Doing this allows participants to understand the array of activities they can do to incorporate working out in their daily routines.



Community Advisory Board

2024 AFP OUTREACH OVERVIEW

Community Action Advisory Board

AFP convened and launched a Community Action Advisory Board (CAAB) on December 1, 2023. The purpose of the CAAB is to guide, influence, and suggest ideas to better message around prevention and testing and to improve the quality of services for individuals living with HIV. CAAB is comprised of nine professionals who are representative of communities impacted by HIV. All CAAB member are actively involved in their community.











Media Campaigns

2024 AFP PROJECTS

Social Media and Messaging

AFP continues to expand social media and messaging initiatives. Some highlights include:

- Developing community-centered weekly content to generate more interactions and presence.
- On Meta Platforms, AFP has 15-45% of consistent interaction, with 20% of interactions outside of followers.







Ryan White Program Media Campaign Collaboration

AFP, JHF, and Yellowbridge Digital collaborate on media campaigns to connect people living with HIV to care in the 11-county region of Southwestern Pennsylvania.

This comprehensive offline-to-online media plan drives awareness of the services offered in the region by AFP partners via AIDSFreePittsburgh.org.




Ryan White Program Media Campaign Collaboration





Campaign tactics include direct mail brochures, newspaper and other print publications, TV and radio spots, dating app ads, billboards, and bus signage and bus stop placements.









In 2024, these campaigns resulted in over 250 million impressions, over 50,000 website visitors, and an above industry average click through rate (CTR) demonstrating the impact and effectiveness of these strategies.

Financial Summary



2024 Financial Summary

AIDS Free Pittsburgh is financially supported by the Allegheny Singer Research Institute (AHN), UPMC Presbyterian Shadyside, and is managed by the Jewish Healthcare Foundation.

A total of \$314,556 in expenses were incurred to support AIDS Free Pittsburgh collective impact project activities during calendar year 2023.

The committed funds have enabled AFP partners to plan and implement quality improvement strategies, toolkits for providers, community outreach initiatives, and HIV/AIDS awareness media campaigns focused on ending the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Allegheny County.
